INTRODUCING CARMEN COURY

Before the start of the Fall 2018 semester, the department gained Latin Americanist Carmen Coury. Dr. Coury's first book, The Saints of Progress: A History of Coffee, Migration, and Costa Rican National Identity, forthcoming(January 2019) with the University of Alabama Press, employs over a hundred oral histories and thousands of archival sources gathered over the course of fifteen months in both Costa Rica and the United States. This work narrates the development of the Tarrazú Valley, a historically remote—though internationally celebrated—coffee-growing region from the early-nineteenth century through to 2015.

Her next research project interrogates Costa Rica's whiteness mythology through a close reading of nationalist literature and textbooks. Secondarily it will explore its limits and consequences of this mythos through the experiences of Costa Ricans who are of African and Indigenous descent.




In Spring 2019, Carmen will teach HIS 480, Seminar in Oral History: Uncovering the Voices of New Haven's Immigrant Past.


