While it is difficult to assess who had the greatest adjustment to make going online, our student teacher candidates and their instructors, Kelly Falvey and Federico Fiondella, as well as our intrepid teacher supervisors (including Kelly), Kathy Coords, Fran Lucibello, Pat Libero, and Mary Skelly perhaps had the most dramatic 'pivot'. Kelly created alternative plans for the remainder of the semester, hosted weekly Zoom meetings for the cohort, and created assignments to guide our students to the completion of their student teaching experience. To celebrate their graduation, Kelly invited Lauren Sepulveda (BS '10) to speak at the final Zoom meeting for the cohort. As the recipient of the 2019-20 National Milken Educator Award excellence in teaching, Lauren was scheduled to speak at a department event in early April, but her words were just as powerful at this virtual celebration as she reminded these future teachers how important their role in society is. The evening celebration included a theme: Dream Vacation Destination. Backdrops included views of football fields, cruise ships going anywhere, sandy beaches and blue oceans, pink flamingos, and exotic drinks. Again there was a spirit of great joy, camaraderie, accomplishment, and appreciation.
