Narrative Overview:

The SCSU MFT program met established benchmarks for sufficiency in the domains of: a) fiscal and physical resources, b) technological resources, c) instructional and clinical resources, d) academic resources, and, e) student support services.

These domains are accessed in formal and informal mechanisms. Assessments since last year s reaccreditation and annual report include the <u>Student Survey of Support Resources</u> and the <u>Sufficiency Survey Faculty Questionnaire</u>. Results from these surveys were evaluated at the Spring MFT Core Faculty Retreat. Informal mechanisms of feedback include mechanisms such as informal ad-ho' meetings between students and faculty advisors or with students in classroom settings (among others).

In our survey of *Student Survey of Support Services*, sufficiency is defined by meeting a benchmark of 65% agreement of needs being met. This was attained and often far surpassed in the results for both the first and second year cohorts of MFT Students. The *Support Sufficiency Survey Faculty Questionnaire* includes adjuncts and all core faculty. In this survey, sufficiency is established if >65% of faculty agree or strongly agree that needs were being met. Data results indicate that greater than 65% of faculty agreed or strongly agreed, this despite the budget freeze in the State of CT. <u>Summary data</u> below: *Student Survey of Support Services (Summary)*

<u>Core Faculty Minutes</u> from June 5, 2017 Annual Retreat included a review of formal and informal feedback received from students. Sufficiency deemed adequate. No significant changes or requests made at this time.

Fiscal and Physical resources:

The MFT Program evaluates Fiscal and Physical resources annually via Student Survey data and Faculty Survey data at our annual review at core faculty retreat. Benchmarks for sufficiency were met or surpassed in the 2016-2017 year. The following resources were added in the 2016-2017 year:

New building planning

The University and MFT program is in the final stages of design of Health and Human Services building. Approved bond money of \$3 million has been obtained, allocated and reserved to move all Health and Human Services under one roof to deliver in an Interdisciplinary Professional Education (IPE) model that will allow cross-education and referral among Marriage and Family Therapy, Communication Disorders, Public Health and Exercise Science. A new Clinic Space will increase MFT client rooms from 5 to 10.

Refurbished classroom space

The University continues its ongoing maintenance and refurbishment of existing classroom space in Davis Hall, where MFT is housed. In the 2016-2017 academic year Davis 101 was given a \$ 00,000 refurbishment to add additional disability resources, technology modernization, and general aesthetic upgrades to this stadium seating lecture classroom. MFT uses this classroom for single section class offerings. The refurbishment project will continue with Davis 102 scheduled for a similar update in the 2017-2018 year. Davis Hall room 223 is currently being renovated to similar specifications, with additional classrooms to follow in subsequent fiscal years.

Increased budget

Despite state budget restrictions, MFT experienced a \$25,692 increase in operating budget in the 2016-2017 budget year. The Dean of Health and Human Services, recognizing the need for additional compensation for the Clinic Director position, agreed to I 1.5 credit per semester compensation increase, bringing the non-teaching load from 3 credits per semester to 4.5 credits. In addition, as a clinical training program, MFT is given carte-blanc in course scheduling and adjunct faculty resources. Our Dean has committed that if we need a course offering as part of our cohort model training program, instructor compensation resources are always available.

Funded Maintenance projects

In addition to the increased budget, the Dean funded two maintenance projects for MFT. Project one was a bond money grant of \$2,000 to fix and provide ongoing maintenance of the clinic video recording system. Request two involved a \$500 allocation of money for Admissions and Orientation resources including an MFT/SCSU branded tablecloth and admissions promotional materials.

Roof replacement

The MFT clinic and program building, Davis Hall, had its roof replaced over the summer of 2017 apro ect with a cost of 80 000. This project included landscaping improvements to improve the aesthetics and functionality of ongoing operations (including tree removal and new plantings).

Technological Resources:

The MFT Program evaluates technological resources annually via Student Survey data and Faculty Survey data at our annual review at core faculty retreat. Benchmarks for sufficiency were met or surpassed in the 2016-2017 year. The following resources were added in the 2016-2017 year:

New color printer

To support teaching, recruiting and clinic functions, the MFT program added a color printer, HP LASERJET Pro M452dw capable of wireless support and double sided printing. This printer augments and supports the existing printing capacity of 2 high capacity printers (Canon IR32351 & HP Laserjet 600), adding double sided color printing support.

New phone system

The University completed a campus wide upgrade internet-based telephony system. This project upgraded phones from previous analogue based technology to internet based calling. The new system automatically sends a voicemail via the University's Outlook email system to provide more immediate access of faculty and staff to students and the community. The system features enhanced conference call capability to establish call in conference lines without outside agency.

Additional computers in clinic

The MFT program added two internet connected personal computers (HP Compaq Elite 8300) in the program's Clinic and Education room. This room is for exclusive use of MFT students and these 2 computers valued at \$800 each bring the total number of PC machines in the space to 6.

Implementation of Webex software

The University began offering Webex to all faculty and staff as of June 30, 2017. Webex is an on-demand collaboration and online meeting center that will offer the MFT program increased distance-based meeting and collaboration opportunities both with and outside the University system.

Transition to Eduroam

The IT Department invested and transitioned to Eduroam which is a standardized wireless internet access portal. This portal allows faculty, students and staff to login and access the internet at SCSU and other participating University's allowing access to the VIP network from a variety of locations and increasing internet accessibility.

Instructional and Clinical Resources:

The MFT Program evaluates Instructional and Clinical resources annually via Student Survey data and Faculty Survey data at our annual review at core faculty retreat. Benchmarks for sufficiency were met or surpassed in the 2016-2017 year. The following resources were added in the 2016-2017 year.

Faculty Grant Money

The MFT program applied for and was awarded 4 Faculty Development Grants ranging from \$500 to \$4,000 dollars. Faculty development awards in the 2016-2017 year included:

- Mindfulness: Tools for professional practice and applications in academia
- Critical Patriotism: Incorporating nationality into mental health systems
- Veterans' War-Trauma, Moral Injury and Post-deployment Family

Upcoming 2017-18 awards include:

• Narrative for Storytelling and Empathy

In addition, one faculty member applied for and received a CSU-AAUP grant of \$6,125.

 Developing core-competencies for clinicians treating moral injury among war veterans: Exploring the perspectives of expert clinicians

Funding for online Kanopy video access, added social science databases and addition of PsychTest (tests, questionaires and research instruments).

The MFT faculty and Social Science librarian Lisa Brier, MA have a collaborative ongoing relationship. MFT faculty requests are submitted and granted in an expedient manner. The MFT faculty requested and Buley library purchased Kanopy online streaming video services. This video service includes numerous MFT specific training videos that students and faculty use for teaching and clinical training. Additional social science databases were added to Buley library's collection in addition to an extensive collection of standardized psychometric testing instruments. In addition, Buley library added 42 books in the Marriage and Family Therapy field at a cost of \$1,946.42.

Writing & research mentorship

The Dean of HHS sponsored a writing retreat with a paid facilitator to assist faculty in research and tenure pursuits. Following attendance at the writing program, the Dean's office paid for ongoing coaching from the facilitator for one MFT faculty member. Due to the success of the workshop offering, this program was continued on an ongoing basis to promote faculty writing and interdisciplinary collaboration.

Release time

Program Director Paul Levatino applied for and granted 3 credits of release time to pursue academic research and tenure related pursuits in fall 2016 or Spring 2017 semester.

Instructional and Clinical Resources (continued)

Updated Blackboard system

The previous Blackboard learning portal for classroom, online and hybrid teaching support was updated to Blackboard Learn. The new system offers greater teaching flexibility including immediate access to system updates, individual decision making in tools availability, as well as increased flexibility in establishing classroom portal policies and procedures.

Increased Clinic Director release time

The MFT program and Dean of Health and Human services have an ongoing and collaborative relationship. The Dean and University recognize the Social Justice and University wide programming contributions of MFT. Upon request and in consultation with the Dean of HHS, the Clinic Director faculty release time was increased from 3 to 4.5 credit hours per semester. This was planned to offer students greater access to the clinic director, reflect increased clinic census numbers, and to provide accurate compensation for the duties and tasks of the position.

Academic Resources:

The MFT Program evaluates Academic resources annually via Student Survey data and Faculty Survey data at our annual review at core faculty retreat. Benchmarks for sufficiency were met or surpassed in the 2016-2017 year. The following resources were added in the 2016-2017 year:

Implementation of Degreeworks program status auditing

Degreeworks is an online portal that offers students the opportunity to review the planned program of study and view real-time program auditing. The school implemented functionality of the system during the 2016-2017 academic year. Students can view which program requirements are completed and needed to support the advisement process.

Additional Library Resources

The MFT faculty and Social Science librarian Lisa Brier, MA have a collaborative ongoing relationship. MFT faculty requests are submitted and granted in an expedient manner. The MFT faculty requested and Buley library purchased Kanopy online streaming video services. This video service includes numerous MFT specific training videos that students and faculty use for teaching and clinical training. Additional social science databases were added to Buley library's collection in addition to an extensive collection of standardized psychometric testing instruments. The library added 42 books in the Marriage and Family Therapy field at a cost of \$1,946.42.

Dissertation and Thesis writing workshop

The School of Graduate Studies, Research and Innovation offered a University wide program to assist students in Dissertation and Thesis writing. This 8 day, twenty-four-hour seminar offering was designed and offered to support advanced students' writing projects.

Added graduate center availability for research, study and innovation

The School of Graduate Studies, Research and Innovation opened a 1,200 square foot Graduate Study/Innovation space to encourage and support class and individual academic pursuits within graduate studies. Specialized materials such as window marker are available to create an interactive learning space.

Graduate student research and creative activity conference

The School of Graduate Studies, Research and Innovation sponsored the first annual Student Research and Creative Activity Conference to showcase graduate student research, mentor professional development and foster social networking within the graduate community. Interdisciplinary collaboration and exposure was promulgated within the different intra-university schools.

Student Support Services:

The MFT Program evaluates Student Support Service resources annually via Student Survey data and Faculty Survey data at our annual review at core faculty retreat. Benchmarks for sufficiency were met or surpassed in the 2016-2017 year. The following new resources were added in the 2016-2017 year:

Counseling Center

The University's Student Counseling Center provides mental health and support services for students daily. The number of Mindfulness and Interpersonal process groups was increased from 2 to 5 offerings per week. The Center added one staff clinician and started open walk-in appointment-free hours from 3:30 to 5PM daily.

Upgrade of school wide Banner System

Banner is SCSU's online portal for registration, attendance and grade reporting. The information technology department will be upgrading Banner in upcoming months to Banner 9. This system will offer an improved portal for student registration and bursar functionality.

Social Justice Program


A new Social Justice Week, an offering co-sponsored by the Office of Diversity, Counseling Services, Office of Diversity and the International Students office was developed and offered to highlight diversity and campus support resources available to students, faculty and staff. The program was offered over 4 days and featured over 45 workshop presentations and offerings.





I attended the orientation specific to the MFT program





HHS Building Architect meeting 6/1

Hello HHS Chairs,

I am very excited to officially announce that we have begun the design process for **Phase I of the HHS Building** (47,000 square feet of programmable space). This building will be located in the space between the new science building and Pelz Gym. The architects have not yet determined how the building will be positioned on that site. The design will plan for a phase I and phase II.

Timing

We waited for approximately 18 months for the CT Department of Administrative Services (DAS) to finalize the contract with **Svigals**, our architects for this project. We had no control over the timing for this project but now that the contract has been signed, the project has officially begun and the programming phase of this project must be completed by July 17th. This phase requires us to determine what programs will be included in Phase I of the building and the amount of space that will be allocated for each programming function. After we complete the programming phase, **Svigals** will spend another 12-18 months designing our building, getting all of the necessary approvals, and working with the State of CT to complete the bidding process. If all goes well, construction may begin in spring 2019.

Scope of Phase I

As you know, HHS faculty and staff completed a programming study in 2015 and determined that we need approximately 150,000 square feet in order to include all programming from all HHS departments in one new building. This plan included approximately 40,000 square feet for shared classrooms and seminar rooms. When we learned that phase I of our project would only be 47,000 square feet, we had some difficult conversations and identified our Department of Nursing and our Clinics/Labs as our highest priority areas. We also decided that we would investigate whether it was possible to adopt efficient office designs that would allow us to accommodate faculty and staff from as many of our Departments as possible. We have another 12,000 square feet allocated for Phase II of the HHS building which is scheduled for design in 2019.



The work on the Davis Hall Roof Replacement will officially begin Tuesday, May 2 and will continue for approximately 6 weeks. The roof removal will take 1 week and the disruptive part of the roof installation will take approximately 3 weeks. During this time the following measures will be in place to protect building occupants and property:

- For approximately 4 weeks the South Entrance to Davis Hall (the building entrance facing Parking Lot #1) will be closed and used only as an emergency exit. This includes the south exit doors from both the Lower Level and the First Floor.
- For the first week of roof removal the entire exterior perimeter of the lecture halls will be cordoned off. There is an expected safety hazard in this area given that these are sloped roof surfaces. Once the roof is removed in this area a smaller enclosure will be just around the south entrance.

Lecture Hall Davis 101 is part of ongoing general purpose classroom renovations in which have been funded for the last 3 years at approximately \$500,0000 per year.

This year's renovations include Davis Hall 101 and Jennings 127. I don't have actual break down of cost between these two rooms but Davis estimated cost before the project was bid out was \$350,000 in construction \$25,000 in audio visual and \$120,000 in furniture. Renovations include replacing worn and must acoustic sound panels carpet, new energy efficient LED Lighting, new seating /table system, and audio visual upgrades.

Davis Hall also has a new roof replacing a roof system installed in 1992 costing approximately \$580,000

Other renovations in Davis have been funded using School of Education resources and funds from the SCSU Foundation.







Dear Southern Faculty,

As you may have heard, Blackboard Learn will soon be undergoing a change. Specifically, we are moving away from our existing environment, hosted by the BOR, to our own Blackboard Learn server. The benefits of this change include receiving immediate access to updates, making our own decisions on tool availability as well as establishing our own policies and procedures.

We will remain on our existing system until Fall 2016 and Wintersession 2017 courses have completed and through the posting of Wintersession final grades.

While we are making every effort to create a seamless transition, we will be required to copy all content, submissions and users from one server to the other. This represents hundreds of gigs of data and will take time to complete. In order to begin archiving and migrating courses, we will shut off access to all courses--except Wintersession—on December 28th. Courses will then be migrated to the new server. All faculty content, student submissions and grades will be retained. Newest courses will be copied first and then we will move backwards until all courses through 2013 have been restored.

As we cannot guarantee when historical courses will be available, it is absolutely imperative that faculty teaching in the Spring 2017 session copy their content now (see attached instruction sheet). You do not need to make changes to the content, you simply need to copy before December 28th. In this way, when you login to the new server on January 2, you will have access to your spring course content, and be able to change due dates and edit content as needed. Older courses will appear as soon as they are copied over.

More communications will be sent as we near the transition dates.

CAMPUS CONNECT

Campus Connect provides gatekeepers with state-of-the-art training which addresses more than just statistics and facts about suicide. Through the use of experiential exercises and frank discussion about gatekeepers' own fears, Campus Connect prepares gatekeepers for the anxiety-provoking situation of interacting with a suicidal student and allows gatekeepers to overcome the obstacles that often leave a student in crisis feeling misunderstood, judged, invalidated, and dismissed. Through connection, Campus Connect gatekeepers can assuage the feelings of isolation of a suicidal student and allow the student to more fully benefit from referral and connection to professional resources.

Introduction

Designed specifically for a college/university community, Campus Connect is an experiential training focused on enhancing gatekeepers' knowledge, awareness, and skills concerning college student suicide. Beyond increasing gatekeepers' knowledge about students in a suicidal crisis, emphasis is placed on developing empathic listening skills, communication skills, and the ability to compassionately and directly ask students about their suicidal thoughts. Moreover, through increased awareness of their own emotional reactions, Campus Connect gatekeepers are able to more effectively respond to students' emotional needs and increase the likelihood of a meaningful connection with appropriate professional resources. In addition to enhanced ability in responding to students in a suicidal crisis, the skills learned in Campus Connect training will enable gatekeepers to respond caringly and effectively to students experiencing a wide range of emotional crises.

Gatekeeper Training

Campus Connect is a three-hour, interactive training program designed for use with a wide variety of campus personnel (e.g., faculty, residence life staff, academic advisors, health center staff, etc.). A Campus Connect gatekeeper training session includes:

Review of college student suicide statistics and facts

Discussion of suicide myths and warning signs

Instruction on how to ask students if they are thinking about suicide and how to refer students to mental health professionals

Review of effective communication and relationship-building skills

Discussion of typical emotional reactions experienced both by students in crisis and responding gatekeepers

Participation in four experiential exercises

Big changes coming to Banner and reporting tools!

System Office Initiatives:

If you use Banner or Brio reports, you will want to know about the forthcoming changes. The Banner initiative is called **Banner Modernization** and **Standardization** and is nicknamed with the initials **BMS**. The reporting initiative is nicknamed **WebFOCUS** after the name of the product. These System Office (BOR) initiatives are meant to bring a plethora of future facing benefits to all of the member institutions of the Connecticut State Colleges & Universities system (CSCU).

BMS Requires Transformation of Reporting Tools:

The existing reporting tools, SQR and Brio, will not be included with **BMS**. The System Office's selected reporting tool, **WebFOCUS**, will take their place in BMS. The functionality provided by the existing reporting tools will need to be transferred to the new reporting tool. A collaborative effort has begun between SCSU-IT, which is developing System Administration capabilities for **WebFOCUS**, and stakeholders, who need to develop Application Administration capabilities in **WebFOCUS**. This will be an arduous task after more than two decades of experience with the old tools. The focus will be on the most critical reports.

- SQRs are scheduled for retirement by October 1, 2017
- Brio reports are scheduled for retirement by November 1,2017

BMS implementation nicknamed the "Lift & Shift":

BMS Lift Scheduled for November 10, 2017:

Banner is scheduled to move from SCSU's data center to the Ellucian Cloud, which is powered by Amazon Web Services (AWS). After the lift, there will be five separate instances of Banner in the Ellucian Cloud. One for each of the four Universities and one for the twelve community colleges. Some identified benefits of the Ellucian Cloud include a more resilient and secure environment leading to improved Disaster Recovery capabilities.

BMS Shift-A = Modernization

Modernization will include upgrading and staying current on the most recent versions of Ellucian products and the implementation of several new products. This includes shifting to Banner 9 for improved administrative and student experience with more flexibility to 'extend' Banners capabilities without customizing code. Additional products will include Ellucian Mobile, Ellucian Content Management (document imaging, management and workflow) to name a few.

BMS Shift-B = Standardization

Standardization is meant to use the most appropriate processes and functionality that comes with Banner 9 and in special situations customizations that add demonstrable value for all of CSCU's institutions. The Standardization will extend to data with input from the IR group to facilitate CSCU wide, comprehensive reporting. All of this is meant to achieve greater consistency and efficiency within CSCU.
