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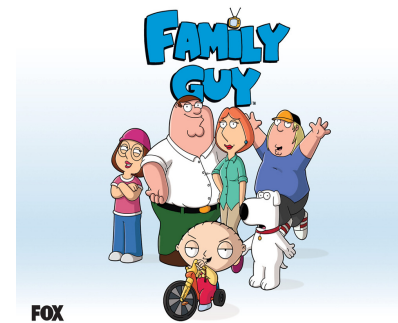

Where do I start?

- Start with a good comprehensive evaluation:
 - WAIS
 - Academic achievement
 - Adaptive functioning
 - Vocational interests, aptitudes, and values
- To earn a 4 year college degree a student must be “otherwise qualified”
- There is no special education in college degree programs
- ADA takes precedence – only reasonable accommodations

Where Do I Start?

- Summer camp attendance – How did that go?
- College summer programs
- Not the ability to, but in the **habit** of:
 - Self-advocating
 - Problem solving
 - Getting self up in the morning
 - Taking own medication regularly & refilling prescriptions
 - Doing own laundry

Education Matters



Post-secondary education is more than simply getting a degree.

Getting a degree should NOT be the end goal!

- Participation in any type of post secondary education (vocational education, college certificate program or even one college course) significantly enhances the ability of individuals with disabilities to secure meaningful employment (Getzel & Wehman, 2005)
- Students with disabilities who earn a B.A. degree obtain subsequent employment at almost the same rate as their neurotypical peers (HEATH Resource Center, 1998; OSER, 2000).

Do Post-Secondary Programs Work?

Wehman et al. (2013)

- Randomly assigned students with ASD to a vocational training vs. business as usual
- Results: 87.5% of the vocational group were employed 6 months after the training vs. 6.25% of the control group

Moore & Schelling (2015)

- 9 out of 10 students with ID who graduated from a post-secondary program were employed within 2 years of the study
- Only 1/2 high school grads with ID employed

Importance of ADLs

- Diamant (2015)
 - Neither I.Q. or academic ability were better predictors of employment and independent living than
 - The ability to successfully and consistently complete activities of daily living

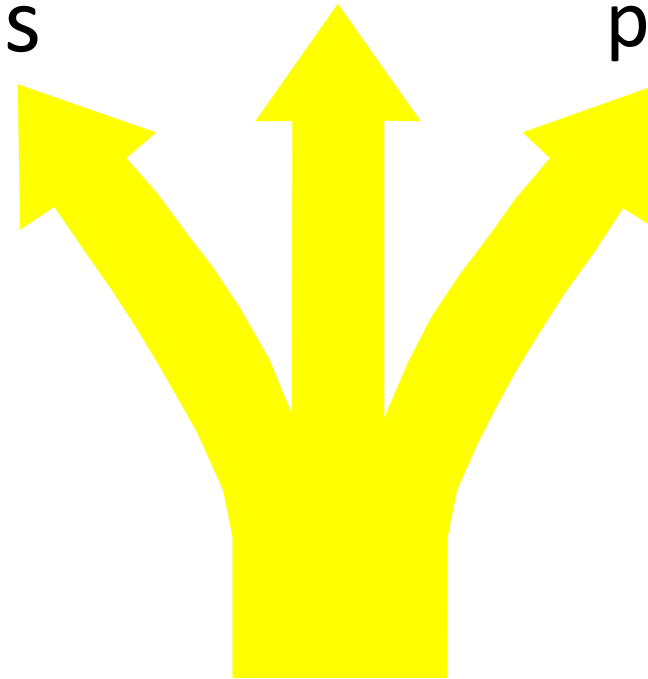
3 Types of Post Secondary Programs

Vocational
Programs

Two Main Types of Transition Programs

- **College Based**
 - These programs are a part of the university.
 - They draw upon the infrastructure of the university.
 - Answer to the hierarchy of the university
- **Community Based**
 - For profit and not for profit social service agencies that typically operate out of apartment complexes
 - Often teach ADLs in students' apartments
 - Ideal for students who have difficulty generalizing skills across environments
 - Have MOUs with community colleges or 4 year institutions
 - Not eligible for Federal Student Aid

Where Do I Find a One
Stop Service Center for
Employment Training
or Pre –ETS?

- **Contact your State Office of Vocational Rehabilitation Services** (e.g. MA = MRC; NY = ACCES-VR; NJ = DVRS; CT = BRS; CA = DOR)
- Ask if they have done a RPF for WIOA & which entities were granted contracts
- This is the best way to determine which social service agencies have been subcontracted by the state
