WHAT WE OFFER

The MLIS program, intended for those seeking to develop or advance in careers in the information professions, gives students two options to pursue their interests. These include School Library Media and the Individualized Program.

The two programs share the core courses but the Individualized Program has flexibility in the choice of electives deemed appropriate for professional practice in public, academic libraries, and digital information management.

The 36-credit curriculum includes six core courses to gain competency in organizing, retrieving, and managing information centers. These courses will provide a familiarity with various technologies and types of library institutions:

ILS 502 Fundamentals of Library and Information Science
ILS 505 Information Resources Organization and Management
ILS 507 Information Science and Technology
ILS 508 User Services
ILS 509 Management of Library and Information Agencies
ILS 582 Library Science Internship

PREPARING FOR CAREERS

There are many job opportunities for MLIS degree holders. Currently, most library science professionals work in school, public, and academic libraries, but employment opportunities are growing most for information specialists in settings such as corporations, consulting firms and information brokers and in environments involving Internet-based information. Additional opportunities may include computer-related jobs that require applicants to have technical computer skills, and research and analyst jobs that require applicants to possess organizational and research skills.
