

Hints for Selecting Classes for your Second Semester

In most cases, you should register for five courses. If you wish to take either four courses or six courses, you should discuss this with your INQ instructor.

Most of you will take all or almost all liberal education (LEP) requirements. If a major course is required or recommended, your INQ instructor will make this change with you.

For the second semester (spring), you should be taking the following courses:

- **MATH:** All students should continue taking math (see Pathways to Mathematics Chart in this folder to understand which math you need to take next)
 - Math courses beyond the 100P/100 level (Intermediate Algebra) are dependent on major and will be specified on the degree evaluation
 - MAT 100P is the extended version of MAT 100. Both are “Intermediate Algebra.”
 - Students who have completed the required math course indicated on their degree evaluation (DE) (see Quantitative Reasoning in T1 of your DE) will not need to take additional math unless required in their major
- **ENGLISH 112:** Any student who took ENG 110 or DID NOT have any English in their first semester should take ENG 112 in the second semester. Any student who had ENG 119 should take ENG 120. Note:** ENG 120 is the equivalent of ENG 112 for bilingual students. Both courses fulfill the Written Communication T1 LEP Requirement)
- **ADDITIONAL 3 COURSES:** Students have options for the next three (or, if they already took ENG 112 or completed their Math requirement, four) courses. You may learn from your advisor that you should take major courses or prerequisites. However, most students will be taking LEP courses, and you can choose from the following LEP Tier 1 or Tier 2 requirements that you have not yet filled:
 - **Tier one: World Language (WLL):** If you have started your WLL sequence, you should continue with the next level) 100—101—200. Students must get to the 200-level of WLL. If you have not started WLL, you may choose to begin it this semester if you would like. If you took the placement test, your scores will be available online. If not, you should take the placement test. Students who are already proficient in a language may choose to waive the language requirement by taking the STAMP exam.
