Sites for PSY 539 (Field Work in Psychology Research)

Lab/Clinic/Organization: The ACCESS Lab

Principal Investigator/Supervisor: Dr. Uche Aneni

Description: The ACCESS Lab focuses on developing digital interventions to identify adolescents at risk for substance use and deliver evidence-based interventions to prevent substance use among adolescents. We employ the socioecological framework to understand risk and protective factors for developing substance use, and barriers and facilitators to accessing interventions. We also employ behavioral change theories and user-centered design to develop evidence-based digital interventions for adolescents. Our approach employs both qualitative (e.g., interviews) and quantitative (e.g., machine learning) methods to answer pressing research questions related to adolescent substance use. As an intern in the lab, you will work with the PI and other members of the lab, gain experience conducting mixed methods research, and have opportunities to contribute to manuscripts.

Description: Our lab aims to advance the understanding, prediction, and prevention of suicide, self-injury, and eating disorders. We integrate methods from across the clinical and computational sciences, including machine learning, mathematical modeling, and ambulatory assessment (via smartphones and wearable biosensors). RAs will have the opportunity to help with many stages of the research process, including literature reviews, IRB protocol/submissions, participant recruitment, phone screening, qualitative interviews, data collection, managing and analyzing data, and discussion of research papers and current projects at lab meetings. This position is ideal for students with interests in clinical & computational psychology.

Course credit or Volunteer: course credit only

Commitment: 2 semesters

Hours/week: 10 hours/week

Materials to Submit: 1) CV, 2) a statement telling us a bit about themselves and why they would like to join the lab, including any prior research experience, 3) completed courses in clinical psychology, statistics, or computer science, and 4) an unofficial transcript.

Internship Opportunities for PSY 539 Under Development

Lab/Clinic/Organization: The McPartland Lab, Yale Child Study Center, Yale School of Medicine

Principal Investigator/Supervisor: Dr. James McPartland, Professor of Child Psychiatry and Psychology

Description: Students will learn about several aspects of the research process; stimulus creation, literature reviews, data collection and analysis. They will will receive training in several aspects of electrophysiological brain research including experimental design; programming experimental paradigms; analyzing and extracting EEG and ERP data. They will also gain further experience with data management and clinical assessments by helping score and file measures. They will have the opportunity to observe cases in the autism clinic and help with child supervision during parent feedback sessions. Students can work towards an independent research project but are required to be involved with our work in the lab for 1 year prior to undertaking a thesis involving original data collection.

Course credit or Volunteer: either, but course credit preferred

Commitment: one or two semesters. Per Yale policy, apply for one semester and can be renewed for a second semester.
