Understanding Your Degree Evaluation

A Guide for New Students

Welcome to Southern! This document is intended to help you understand the structure of your Southern degree by reviewing the parts of your Degree Evaluation.

Southern uses a tool called **Degree Works** to track your progress towards your degree. Degree Works has two parts:

- Degree Evaluation: Shows a check-list of your requirements and your progress towards completing them.
- Degree Plan: Shows your degree requirements as a map to graduation. You and your advisor will use this plan to arrange your required courses in the way that makes sense for you.

This guide will walk you through the Degree Evaluation. Once you have finished this guide, you can move on to the "Understanding Your Degree Plan" guide.


Parts of Your Degree Evaluation

Open your Degree Evaluation and follow along as we walk through its parts. Understanding these parts will help you to understand the structure of your degree and the requirements that you must take to complete your degree.


Make sure you note any questions that you have about your Degree Evaluation so that you can ask them during your advising appointment.

Degree Overview

The top of your Degree Evaluation lists basic information about your degree. Here you will see your current program, any minors you have declared, your advisor/s' names, your overall progress to degree completion, and your overall Southern GPA.



The first block on your degree evaluation gives you a snapshot overview of your degree.



An undergraduate degree is made up of 120 credits; at least 30 of those credits must be taken at Southern to earn a degree from Southern.

The number of free elective credits listed here is determined by the number of credits in your major and whether or not you have any cognate requirements, minors, or accelerated pathways.

The Degree Evaluation does the math for you!

Southern's minimum GPA requirement is a 2.0. However, your major may have a higher GPA requirement; this will be indicated on your Degree Evaluation if it is true for your major.

Requirements


Each line of your Degree Evaluation represents a requirement you must complete to earn your degree.



Note that in some cases, you must earn a minimum grade in order for the course to count towards the requirement. These grade minimums are indicated on your degree evaluation. In this example, the student must earn a C or better in EDU 200 and a B- or better in the United States History course.

Progress Towards Degree

Your Degree Evaluation will track your progress towards degree completion. If a specific course must be taken for a requirement, it will be listed on the Degree Evaluation.



A red circle on the Degree Evaluation means that you have not yet completed this requirement. In this example, the student must still take a course in Technological Fluency. Clicking the blue link "attribute=T1TF" will show all courses that can be taken to fulfill this requirement.

A green checkmark means the requirement has been completed. Requirements can be completed by successfully completing the required course, by transfer credits, or by waivers.

A blue half circle means the requirement is in progress. This means you are currently registered for (either in the current term or the next term) for a course that fulfills this requirement. These **in-progress courses** are included in the credit count listed at the top of your Degree Evaluation.


To graduate, all requirements on your degree evaluation must be checked off as complete.

General Education Requirements

The next three blocks on your Degree Evaluation list your General Education requirements. These include: W-courses, LEP Foundations courses, and LEP Explorations courses.

Writing Intensive Course Requirement (W-courses)

Southern has a Writing Requirement of 3 W-courses. **W-Courses** are indicated by a W by the section number on the course schedule.



W-courses can "double-dip" or count towards both the W-requirement and any other requirement on your degree. That means that you can take a W-course as an LEP course, as a major or cognate course, or as a free elective.


You can not take a W-course until you have met the Written Communication Requirement in LEP Foundations.

When you register for a W-course it will appear in this block of your degree evaluation. If the W-course is also an LEP course, major course, or cognate course, it will also appear in that block. If the W-course does not meet an LEP requirement, major requirement, or cognate requirement, it will NOT appear in the free electives list BUT it will reduce your overall required free electives.

Most majors have at least one W-course within the major. Your Degree Plan template will indicate recommended semesters to take one of your courses as a W-section.

General Education: LEP Foundations

LEP Foundations Courses cover areas of knowledge that are foundational for students in all majors.




You may have **waivers** in LEP Foundations based on your high school transcript or placement test scores. In this example the Written Communication Prerequisite Requirement is waived.

A waiver means you do not have to take that required course; however, you do not receive credit for the course. Instead, you will take additional free-electives later in your program to get up to your 120 credits.

General Education: LEP Explorations

LEP Explorations Courses are intended to encourage you to explore a wide variety of disciplinary areas. There are 6 required LEP Explorations category areas and two required LEP Explorations Electives; LEP Explorations Electives can be filled by a course from any LEP Explorations category.



There are two options for fulfilling your Natural World requirement. All students must take at least one 4-credit lab-science course (either in Life & Environment or Physical Realm).

- If you take a 4-credit Life & Environment course, option I will be marked as filled and option II will go away once you register for your Physical Realm course.
- If you take a 4-credit Physical Realm course, option II will be marked as filled and option I will go away once you register for your Life & Environment course.

You may elect to take two 4-credit science courses.

In some cases you may see specific courses recommended in LEP categories as in this example:

These recommendations are for courses that will count both towards an LEP requirement and a requirement in your major or cognate block.

- Following the recommendation will allow you to "double-dip" and count the course towards both requirements. This student took HIS 110 as recommended.
- If you do not follow the advice but take a different LEP course, the course you take
 will still count towards your LEP requirement; however, you will still need to take the
 recommended course later to fulfill your cognate or major requirement. This
 student took ANT 101 which does fulfill the LEP requirement. They will need to take
 EDU 200 and SHE at some point as both are cognate requirements.
- You can use your LEP Elective space for these recommended courses. So this student can take EDU 200 and SHE 203 and have them fulfill their Exploration Elective slots.


Make sure you pay attention to, and follow, the advice on your Degree Evaluation! Your Degree Plan template will reflect the advice on your Degree Evaluation (see the Degree Plan tutorial for more information).

The Major Block

The next block on the Degree Evaluation shows the requirements specific to your chosen major.

At the top of this block you will see your major GPA; this GPA is calculated based only on the courses in this major block.

You will also see a credit count for total courses within the major.




Each line in the major block represents a requirement in the major.

- In some cases there is a particular course you must take to fulfill that requirement. For example, the requirement "The Historian's Craft" can only be fulfilled by taking HIS 200.
- In some cases you have a list of options that will fulfill a requirement. For example,
 the requirement "European History" can be fulfilled by any of the courses listed to
 the right. Keep in mind that not all courses are offered every semester. You should
 check the schedule listings and ask your advisor about when major courses are
 offered.
- In some cases you have many choices to fulfill a requirement. For example, "History Electives at the 200-level or above" requires that you take 6 credits in HIS; only courses at the 200-, 300-, or 400-level will satisfy this requirement.


Cognate Requirements

The next block on your Degree Evaluation will only be present if you are in a degree program that has cognate requirements. Cognate requirements are courses that are related to your major and required by your degree program.



Minor Requirements


The next block will only appear if you have declared a minor. The Minor block shows the requirements for your selected minor.



Free Electives


The next block on your Degree Evaluation is the Free Elective block. If you have not yet taken free electives, this block will not yet appear.

The number of free electives you need varies depending on your chosen major and/or minor. You can see the total number of free electives you need at the top of your Degree Evaluation. The free elective block will tell you how many you have earned.



Accelerated Pathway


The next block will only appear if you have indicated interest in an accelerated pathway (taking graduate courses as an undergraduate student.



If you have an accelerated pathway, you will work with your advisor in your junior year to select appropriate graduate courses.

Excess Credits


The next block will only appear if you have earned excess credits. Excess credits are courses that you have earned credit for and that will appear on your transcript; however, these courses do not fulfill a requirement for your current program nor do you need them to complete your free elective requirement.



If new courses appear in your excess courses list after you register, you should check with your advisor to see if you need to change your registration.

Insufficient


This next block will only appear if you have courses that do not earn credit towards your degree or that do not meet the minimum grade requirements towards your degree.



If you withdraw from a course, fail a course, or do not meet the required minimum grade for a course, that course will appear in the insufficient block.

In Progress/Planned Courses

The last block on your Degree Evaluation shows the courses you are currently taking (in progress) as well as those you have registered for in up-coming terms (planned).



These in progress courses are included by default in the progress towards degree calculations on the Degree Evaluation.

Next Steps

Now that you are more familiar with the parts of your Degree Evaluation, you are ready to use the Degree Plan tool to map out your classes!
